Tradition, and it is a most unlikely one, says that Thomas and Geoffrey Woolley came from England or Wales, (about 1620?), and settled in New Jersey. One of the brothers went to Cuba or the west, and never was heard from. While from the other

brother the family has been supposed to descend.

The Documentary History of New York, Albany, 1850, gives the following information concerning persons of the name of Woolley: In 1683, there lived at Southampton, L. I., Robert and John Wooley, spelling the name with only one "l." In 1698, the census of Southampton shows Robert, John and Joseph Wooley; also Ann, Elizabeth, Hannah, Phebe, and Mary Woolley. Vol. 1, page 248, makes mention of John Woolley, in 1673, and H. Onderdonk's History of Roslyn and Hempstead, L. I., speaks of John Woolley, Sr., as marshal and constable, Apr. 1, 1686. He probably was father of the John Woolley who married July 6, 1728, Hannah Allen, both being of Great Neck or Hempstead, L. I.

Robert Woolley, first of Fairfield, Mass., and from 1653 to 1683, of Southampton, L. I., was son of Robert Woolley and Theckla Pemberton, his wife, of Hertfordshire, England. Baptised at St. Albans, Aug. 2, 1615, he emigrated to this country, in 1639, and was the ancestor of the Woolleys of Springfield, Essex (now Union) Co., N. J. His sister, Ellen Woolley, baptised Oct. 15, 1611, was mentioned in the will of James Williams, citizen and merchant tailor, London, Sep. 7, 1620, as his god-daughter, while in the will of Roger Pemberton, of St. Albans, Hertfordshire, she is called his grand-daughter, Robert Woolley is called his son-in-law, and Theckla, his daughter, is spoken of as the wife of Robert Woolley. This is seen from Genealogical Gleanings in England,

by Henry F. Waters, as published in the New England Register, volume 43.

From Progress and Public Processions of Queen Elizabeth, Vol. 3, page 81, is derived the following: Sir John Woolley, born Shropshire, graduated Oxford 1553; traveled beyond the seas 1557; became Secretary to Queen Elizabeth 1568; made Prebendary of the Church of Welles 1569; died 1595; buried in St. Paul's, London. His son, Francis Woolley, died 1611. Sir John married, second, Elizabeth, daughter of Sir William More.

Whether there is any relationship between any of the foregoing Woolleys and Emmanuel Woolley, of Newport, Rhode Island, has yet to be discovered. Thus far

the only thing we know is that the names are the same.

From Austin's Genealogical Dictionary we learn that Emmanuel Woolley was made freeman of Newport, May 17, 1653; May 13, 1667, he and others skilled therein were ordered to repair all arms brought to them by the Captain or Lieutenant of the Train Band of Newport; taxed in 1680, £1-7-11; and May 4, 1681, the Assembly remitted his forfeiture of a bond of recognizance for good behavior and appearance at the last General Court of Trials, he not appearing.

The statement has been made that he came to Shrewsbury, N. J., in 1660, but the sole evidence of that, if true, lies in the fact that, to the extent of three pounds, he was one of the contributors for the purchasing of lands from the Indians. No land was patented to him; there is no warrant for any survey of land in his name; and no deed is of record in which he appears as grantor. It is, therefore, likely that the share of land

he purchased was given or sold to one of his sons.

Of his children, nine in number, all except the oldest and youngest sons came to Monmouth Co., N. J., Edward settling, at Manasquan, John, at Poplar, where he had many acres of lands adjoining those of his father-in-law, Thomas Potter, and William Woolley, at Shark River.

Emmanuel Woolley married Elizabeth , and had

3 EDWARD WOOLLEY, son of Emmanuel Woolley, 1, would appear to have been of Rhode Island when his first child was born, and not to have come to Monmouth Co., N. J., until about 1687, when his name is first mentioned there in a deed from William Chamberlain, Nov. 19, 1687, for his one-half interest in a tract of one hundred acres of land that had been patented to himself and Robert West, and for which a patent was duly issued, in their rights, Mch. 22, 1687/8, to Edward Woolley, of Shroesberry. He married Lydia, daughter of George and Hannah Allen, born June, 1660; described himself as a "hatter," in deeds given in 1690, and as a "feltmaker," in deeds of 1701; and signed his will Jan. 3, 1728/9, which is without date of probate. While in the township of Shrewsbury, he seems to have owned land at Passequenecqua, on Rumson Neck, and to have lived at Manasquan.

After living for a time at Shrewsbury, he must have gone back to Rhode Island, where two more of his children were born, in 1692 and 1694, and then have returned to New Jersey, where the balance of his children were born. At least that is the idea to

be derived from deeds and from the records of the Quaker Meeting at Shrewsbury.

1692, Oct. 31. John Bowne, of Middletown, owner of one twentieth of one twenty-fourth share of the Province, gave a deed for sixty acres of upland and meadow, at Barnegat, to Edward Woolley, late of Shrewsbury, now of Rhode Island.

1696, Dec. 3. Lydia Woolley signs as a witness at the marriage of her niece, Mary

Allen to Thomas French, Jr.

1699, Apr. 7. Both Edward and Lydia Allen are witnesses at the marriage of

Joseph Parker to Elizabeth Lippincott.

1699, May 20. John Leonard, of Shrewsbury, conveys to Benjamin Cook, of Middletown, one hundred and twenty acres of land that had been bought of Edward Woolley; one half of which was on the North side of the Manasquan River, the other half on Barnegat Creek.

1699/1700, Mch. 4. Samuel Webb, of the Island of Barbadoes, and wife, Lucy, convey to Edward Woolley, of Shrewsbury, various tracts of land in Shrewsbury

township.

1727/8, Jan. 31. He was one of those to take the inventory of the personal estate of Nicholas Mills.

1728/9, Jan. 3. Will of Edward Wooley, of Shrewsbury, yeoman, mentioned:

wife Lydia, executrix; second son, Edward; eldest son, Adam; son, George; daughter, Hannah, wife of George Allen; daughter, Content; daughter, Ruth; grandchildren, viz.: the children of Elizabeth, the deceased wife of Gabriel Stelle. Witnesses: Adam Brewer, Joseph West and Geo. Thornborough.

1732, Nov. 3. Will of Lydia Woolley, widow; proved July 20, 1742, mentioned:

daughters, Ruth, Content Bills; Hannah Little; and deceased daughter, Elizabeth Stelle, wife of Gabriel Stelle; sons, Adam and George

Absolute proof of this connection is shown in the Journal of Daniel Stanton, the distinguished Quaker preacher, where, under the date of "Six month, 1674," he wrote:

"Attended yearly meeting at Flushing crossed the Narrows to Staten Island, and thence with Joseph Shotwell to his home, and after having meetings at Rahway, Woodbridge and Plainfield, accompanied by him and his wife over Amboy ferry, we went to Nathan Tilton's and from thence to Shrewsbury, where I attended two large meetings: after the last I went home with James Tucker, my father's cousin."

James Tucker was the son of John and Ruth (Woolley) Tucker, and his mother must have been own sister to the grandmother of the writer of the above extract.

1685, Oct. 26. Memorandum of a deed from Daniel Stanton, of Rhode Island, mariner, to Ralph Trenoweth, of Burlington, for all the former's right, title and interest in one hundred acres of land. [West Jersey Records, Liber B, Part 1, page 79.]

1695, May 24. The original marriage license of Thomas Foreman and Mary Allen is in the New Jersey Historical Society's Library. The record of their marriage, May 27, 1695, before L. Morris, is found in *Book C*, of *Deeds*, at Freehold.

1711, Apr. 2. Thomas Forman and John Frazier made inventory of the personal estate of Benjamin Cook, of Freehold, which is without date but was sworn to by

Bridget, the widow of Benjamin Cook, at this time.

1723, Nov. 26. Will of Thomas Forman, of Freehold; proved Dec. 5, 1723, mentioned:

wife, Mary; daughter, Rebecca, wife of Gerard Edge, and her children Mary and Daniel; son-in-law, Isaac Forman. Benjamin Forman, given a legacy as a bar against any claim to any part of my estate as heir-at-law.

Executors: wife, and son-in-law, Isaac Forman. Witnesses: Charles Hub, Robert White, Jonathan

Hutchins.

1685, July 9. John Woolley and his brother, William Woolley, together with Richard Hartshorne, John Hance, Judah Allen, Remembrance Lippincott, William Lawrence, John Williams and Edmund Lafetra, had license to purchase Indian lands

at Manasquan.

Woolley bought of Tucker, at Poplar, described as bounded on all sides by barren pine lands. Previous to this, in 1684 and 1692, Thomas Potter sold to John Tucker lands at Deal, bounded on the West by barren land, on the South by a brook which separated it from the line of Thomas White, on the East by the Sea to Whale Pond brook, comprising what is now Elberon, N. J., and lands adjacent to it to the South and Westward.

1698, July 19. Mercy Woolley makes affidavit relating to the signing and sealing

of the last will of Samuel White, of Shrewsbury, the date of which was omitted.

1702, Nov. 2. Mary Woolley is left a legacy by her father, Thomas Potter, of Freehold.

1705, Apr. 14. George Allen, John Woolley and Peter Wilson take the inventory of the personal estate of Joseph Allen, of Shrewsbury.

1706, May 2. George Allen, John Woolley and John Rogers make inventory of the

estate of Francis Borden, of Shrewsbury.

1707. According to James Steen, John Woolley swore that he was forty-six years old. 1709, Mch. 1. John Woolley was a Road Commissioner in Monmouth County.

1717. Nov. 9. John Woolley, of Shrewsbury, yeoman, and Mercy, his wife, convey to "my son William Woolley," land at Poplar Swamp, that is described as being the Northwest corner of the said John Woolley's land, and as having been conveyed to him by Thomas Potter, Feb. 9, 1697. Witnesses: Gabriel Stelle, Benjamin Woolley and Robert Allen.

1719/20, Mch. 17. John Lippincott, of Shrewsbury, in his will of this date left a legacy to the Friends' Meeting, in Shrewsbury, which was to be paid to John Woolley

and John Tilton.

1739, Mch. 5. John Woolley and wife, Rachel, were present at the marriage of his grand-daughter, Hannah Woolley, to George Nicholson, at the house of Thomas Woolley, in Shrewsbury.

1752, 9mo., 25. Will of Rachel Woolley, widow; proved Feb. 25, 1754, left legacies

to:

And it would seem as though he made his residence in that part of the township which was at Shark River.

1685, July 9. William Woolley and his brother, John, with others had warrant to

purchase land of the Indians.

1685/6, Feb. 20. He is mentioned as owning land on the South side of the Manasquan River, and Mch. 22, 1687/8, as bounding lands patented to Frances, the wife of Edmund Lafetra, on the North side of the same River.

1687, Oct. 28. He was a witness at the marriage of Ephraim Allen and Margaret

Wardell.

1690, June 20. Nicholas Brown, planter, of Shrewsbury, conveyed land at Shark

River to William Woolley, of Shrewsbury.

1690, Oct. 7. Nicholas Brown, yeoman, of Shrewsbury, conveyed land to William Woolley, of Shark River, that was bounded on the Northeast by land of Edward Woolley, and this land also was deeded seemingly to William Woolley by Edward Woolley, hatter, on the 27th of the same month.

1691, May 23. William Woolley, planter, and Anne, his wife, deed land to Stephen Cook, planter, part of which was their's by patent dated Dec. 10, 1681, and part of it

conveyed by deed of Remembrance Lippincott, dated Feb. 17, 1684.

1691, September. William Woolley was on a Petit Jury in Monmouth County.

1691, Sep. 23. William Woolley and Anne, his wife, of Shrewsbury, convey to Joseph Lawrence, of Middletown, fifty acres of land, at Manasquan, that had been granted to him July 9, 1685.

1692, Nov. 2. Confirmation made to Gavine Drummond of one hundred acres of

land, "in the barrens, where William Woolley and W. West mowed their hay."

1694/5, Feb. 13. John West and William Wooly were fellow bondsmen with William West, of Shrewsbury, and his wife, Margaret, formerly the widow of Ephraim Allen, as executors of the last will of the said Ephraim Allen.

1698/9, Jan. 10. William Woolley, John Tilton, Johanna Grant [Gaunt?] and Abiah Edwards were witnesses to the will of Thomas Webley, of Shrewsbury.

1701, Oct. 17. William and Anne Woolley were witnesses at the marriage of Joseph Lippincott and Elizabeth White, at the house of Mary White, at a public meeting of Friends.

1704. He was commissioned Captain for Manasquan and Shark River.

1707, Sep. 3. William Woolley was a witness when his nephew, Thomas Woolley, married Patience Tucker.

170..., Feb. 6. John Dennis, David Stout and William Woolley were the witnesses

to the will of Robert Drummond, of Shrewsbury.

1717/8, Feb. 26. Leah Bennet, widow and executrix of Thomas Bennet, of Shrews-

bury, swore to the (undated) inventory of his personal estate, made by William Woolley, Gavin Drummond and Thomas Chambers.

1718, Oct. 11. Richard Stout, Jr., as heir to his brother, David, deceased, with

Eve, his wife, convey land to William Woolley, the son of William Woolley.

1720/5, Jan. 11. Will of Priscilla Hearse, of Shrewsbury, widow of Thomas Hearse; proved Mch. 1, 1729/30, left legacies to:

her brother, Joseph Hickke; her sister, Elizabeth Williams, who has as children Mary and Gabriel Williams; her sister, Patience, who has three children; to Mary, Audrey and John, children of Audrey Webley; to Elizabeth Webley, Ann and Audrey Chambers; and to Elizabeth and Audrey, daughters of William and Anne Woolley.

Her real estate she left to her executors, John West and Richard Chambers.

Witnesses: Edward Faulkner, John Chambers and William Brinley.

The Shrewsbury Quaker Record give the names and dates of birth of all the children of Edward Woolley and Lydia, his wife, and of John Woolley and Mercy, his wife, but have no corresponding entry for the children of William Woolley. It is natural, therefore, to ascribe all the males of this line of the third generation, whose names have been found, as his children. They are four in number, viz.: Bartholomew, Emmanuel, Peter and Ezekiel.

In 1685, Thomas Potter and John Tucker were charged with the quit rents on

one thousand acres of land, in Shrewsbury.

1687, June 14. Peter Easton, of Newport, R. I., conveyed to John Tucker, of East Jersey, all his rights of land in Monmouth Co.

1687, Aug. 18. John Tucker, of Deale, Monmouth Co., conveyed the preceding

rights to Thomas Hilborn, of Shrewsbury.

1688, Dec. 12. John Tucker and Ruth Tucker were witnesses at the marriage of Thomas Hillborn and Elizabeth Hutton; and again, Mch. 5, 1739, when George Nicholson, of Chesterfield, married Hannah Woolley, in Shrewsbury.

1690/1, Jan. 7. John Tucker is mentioned in the will of Jonas Hall, of Shrewsbury,

and is made residuary legatee and executor.

1692, Nov. 2. John Tucker is named as one of those bounding property that was

confirmed to Gavine Drummond, on Poplar Swamp Brook.

The Tucker family, of Dartmouth, has in its possession a paper given by Patience, the daughter of Abraham and Mary (Slocum) Tucker, and wife of Thomas Woolley, 20, that reads as follows:

"Shrosbury ye 10th 11m. 1710.
I acknowlidg that I have Resived that twenty pound Legese that my father gave me: by my Unkel John Tucker. I say Resived by me

Amos White hannah "

This receipt may have been the basis for the statement that has been made that

"Nathaniel Slocum, brother-in-law of John Tucker, is the progenitor of the Slocum family in this [Monmouth] county."

But whether the assertion was founded on it or not, it forms a material aid in disclosing the relationship between the Tucker and Slocum families, and, taken in connection with the signatures of witnesses on the Shrewsbury Quaker Records, indicates, with sufficient certainty for it to be relied upon, that Abraham Tucker, brother to the above mentioned John Tucker, married, Oct. 30, 1679, Mary, daughter of Giles and Joan Slocum; and that their sister, Hannah Tucker, married Nathaniel Slocum, a son of the same Giles and Joan Slocum.

Gabriel Stelle married, for his second wife, Margaret, daughter of Thomas* and Janet (Mudie) Gordon, and widow of Lewis Carré, and by her had a son, Thomas Gordon Stelle, who was baptised, as shown on the Records of Christ Church, Shrewsbury, Oct. 24, 1734, and a daughter, Margaret Stelle, who married about 1755, Andrew Hamersly.

His first wife and two of their children are buried in Christ Churchyard, the stones erected to their memory being placed in the yard close against the building line of the Church, as is also another stone, to the memory of Elizabeth Stelle, which is in such a condition that the epitaph has been completely lost; it probably was that of the daughter, Elizabeth, who was baptised as an adult, at Allentown.

Possibly they are buried in the Friends' Burying ground at Shrewsbury. But one has to be careful as regards any positive statement thereto, on account of the unauthorized action of a loyal descendant of the family, himself bearing the name of Woolley, and being one of the few living members of the Meeting. He saw the distressing and objectionable way in which the Burying ground had been allowed to stand, and, obtaining funds for the purpose, had it put in proper order, and granite stones erected as marks of respect to his ancestors, viz.:

There was not the slightest scrap of evidence existing to indicate that any one of the first six persons mentioned above had been buried in the yard. He has given erroneous dates in some instances. He calls John's wife Mary, when she was generally known as Mercy. And he was absolutely wrong in asserting that Catharine Cook was the wife of Benjamin Woolley, 53, the son of John, Jr., 23. The dates of birth and death of that Catharine, who married this Benjamin, are given correctly, but it was not Catharine Cook, rather was it Catharine Husbands. Catharine Cook became the third wife of Benjamin Woolley, 25, in 1744, and probably had no issue by him, while it was Catharine Husbands, "spinster," who had marriage license dated Apr. 2, 1750, with Benjamin Woolley, Jr., 53, and called "junior" for the very purpose of distinguishing him from his uncle, the husband at that time of Catharine Cook. As proof of the correctness of this position there are the positive facts, first, that the oldest child of this

marriage was born in 1752, or not until eight years after the marriage of Catharine Cook took place; and secondly, that in the Parker family descended from Benjamin Woolley, 53, there is a small book with the dates of death of the parents, and of birth and death of their children, and this reads:

"REDEMPTIONERS"

IN

NEW JERSEY

The great dissatisfaction existing among the lowly and not infrequently in the middle and higher classes throughout Great Britain, especially where the moral sentiment was opposed to the licentiousness of the day and where many were the subjects of religious oppression, turned the thoughts and steps of many towards the New World, where, from kinsmen and friends, glowing accounts had been written home of the equality of man, his religious freedom and his landed betterment.

How to reach this Mecca was a problem difficult of solution. Shortly a way arose and there was a strange intermingling of the poor and the rich in the emigration. With the development of this country, laborers, of all kinds, were needed and the distressed at home, without funds, sold their services for a term of years, at the end of which, they redeemed themselves by reason of their labor and were discharged, with a modest

equipment, from their late employers.

The speculative sea captain, the extensive landholder and merchant, alike, saw the chance for gain and imported this element, indenting each individual in written or printed contracts, of which today a number exist, and which they transferred or "sold" as opportunity arose. The majority of the emigrants were laborers, others came qualified with a knowledge of trades, glaziers, carpenters, blacksmiths, bricklayers, painters, joyners, etc., etc., and the whole were spoken of as "servants."

In addition to the laboring element there were many who did not scruple, though of gentle birth and refinement, to hire themselves out for domestic purposes. Often one who was reasonably prosperous in the Old World, and whose estates had been confiscated, was left with so little that it barely sufficed to "import himself," while his wife and children would come in the same ship as "indented servants." The Redemptioner frequently rose with such rapidity that he was able to purchase the unexpired contracts of the various members of his family and assemble them about him in his own home. Not infrequently the master married his "servant," or the "servant" would marry his mistress.

Hardship was the inevitable lot of all the early settlers and the Redemptioner either suffered or enjoyed according to the worldly prosperity and the gentleness of his employer. There were hard taskmasters, but the slavery was not akin to that of the negro in our South, for the populated portion of the country was small and kindred were

not divorced from each other and the term of servitude was often short.

The Redemptioner frequently filled official positions under the government and was conspicuous in organized church work. His social distinction regulated itself promptly, and he likely assumed in this community the same position that he held in his former home. Today, the blood of the Redemptioner is mingled with every good strain that crossed to the New Jersey shore and his descendants can look with pride to his ambition, courage and moral force.

After the first great exodus, 1682-1685, made up entirely of Scotch Protestants, there was apparently some diminution in the numbers which came to this country, and little by little the character of the individual changed, so that in the first quarter of the 16th century, the Redemptioner was an ordinary case of "contract labor," fired by no lofty religious enthusiasm and probably of no social cast. At what time this type of

importation ceased I have not ascertained.

The recording of "indentured persons" protected all concerned from infractions of the contract. It was not conceived, however, for this reason, but for the object of securing from the Proprietors such lands as were allotted under the Laws of Concessions, to each settler, male and female, master or servant. Thus it is that the following lists include both.

WODROW'S HISTORY OF THE SUFFERINGS OF THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND FROM THE RESTORATION TO THE REVOLUTION

Having in the former section given the history of the sufferings of these good people who were taken to Dunnotter this summer, I am now to follow a good many of them to America.

Argyle's invasion being now over, and no more fears from that airt,[?] the council began to weary of the prisoners at Dunnotter, and brought them back to Leith, as we have seen, where another essay was made to bring them to comply with the impositions now put on people in their circumstances; and upon their refusal, they resolved to send good numbers of them to the plantations, and so rid themselves of any more trouble about them. Accordingly, after near three months' severe treatment at Dunnotter, they come to Leith, two of them were left behind as dying men, of which Quintin Dick, so frequently mentioned, was one, and in his remarks formerly cited, he hath some sweet observations upon providence timeing his sickness at this juncture. He recovered in some time, and was overlooked, and got safe home to his own house, and lived some years to reflect with pleasure, and record the Lord's wonderful steps of kindness to him, and his goodness under, and after all those sore troubles he underwent. Not a few who were in the great vault were sick, and allowed horses upon their own charges. The Reverend Mr. Frazer was very infirm and weak, and yet the captain by no means would permit him to have the benefit of a hired horse, as several others had. The foot had sixty-six miles to travel, and their hands tied behind their back with small cords. From Dunnotter they were carried to Montrose tolbooth the first night, from thence to Arbroath, from thence to Dundee, from thence, upon the Sabbath, to the Cowpar of Fife, from thence to Burntisland, and thence to Leith.

The council were pleased to come down to Leith, and sit in the tolbooth there, and spent some time in the re-examination of the prisoners. It was but very few complied with their impositions, and they were dismissed. Others, who were very weakly, and had some friends to intercede, got off upon a bond of compearance when called, as Mr. William M'Millan, who gave bond as above, under the penalty of five thousand merks. The most part of them refusing the oaths, and to satisfy in other particulars, were perpetually banished to America, and many of them were gifted to the laird of Pitlochy, to be carried thither. William Hannah, formerly mentioned, in the parish of Tunnergarth, when brought before the lords, and refusing the oath of allegiance with the supremacy, was threatened with banishment. He told them, that he was now too old to work, or go to war, and he reckoned he would be useless there. Old general Dalziel took him up very bitterly, and replied, he was not too old then to be hanged, and he would hang well enough. That same day, as my information bears, August 22d, the general died suddenly, and William's age and sickness prevented his being carried away with the rest. In a few weeks he fell very ill in prison, and appearing to be in a dying condition, he was liberate, and got home, after very hard sufferings for three years and

The names of as many as are come to my hand, who were banished, shall be insert just now. Let me only remark, that such who had not to pay their freight, were gifted to George Scot laird of Pitlochy, who freighted a Newcastle ship, Richard Hutton master, bound for New-Jersey; and all the persons now banished were committed to his care. I cannot give an account of all the names of such as were banished with Pitlochy; Several of their testimonies and letters they wrote to their friends toward the end of August are before me; and particularly an original letter, from about twentyeight of them, dated Leith Road, August 28th, 1685, directed to their friends, too long to be here insert. In short they signify, "That now being to leave their own native and covenanted land by an unjust sentence of banishment, for owning truth, and holding by duty, and studying to keep by their covenant engagements and baptismal vows, whereby they stand obliged to resist, and testify against all that is contrary to the word of God and their covenants; and that their sentence of banishment ran chiefly because they refused the oath of allegiance, which in conscience they could not take, because in so doing, they thought they utterly declined the Lord Jesus Christ from having any power in his own house, and practically would, by taking it, say he was not King and head of his church, and over their consciences; and on the contrary, this was to take and put in his room a man whose breath is in his nostrils, yea, a man that is a sworn enemy to religion, an avowed papist, whom by our covenants we are bound to withstand, and disown, and that agreeably to the scripture, Deut. XVII. 14, 15." They go on to leave their testimony against the evils of the times, and for the preaching of the gospel in the fields and houses, and sign as follows.

Besides those I have before me letters of John Arbuckle, John M'Queen, a letter signed I. D. and K. G. and another signed Janet Symington, all of them banished at this time, with many others whose names are not come to me; we shall just now find some of them among those who died at sea in the voyage. In the same ship likewise were Mr. John Frazer, and that excellent gentleman Robert M'Lellan of Barmagechan, of whom more just now, William Niven in Pollockshaws, with a good many others who had endured Dunnotter cruelties. And it is mostly from Mr. Frazer and Barmagechan's account of this voyage, that I am to frame the following narrative of it. Several others were likewise in the vessel, who retired from their native country to settle in America, as the reverend Mr. Archibald Riddel, whom we had in the former part of this history, and his wife, and several of the relations of such who went over.

The prisoners lay some time in the road of Leith, before all was ready, and sailed

the 5th of September. Informations before me bear, that Pitlochy tampered with some of them, particularly James Forsyth, to get money before they sailed, offering for five pounds sterling paid now, to set him at liberty as soon as they came to land. But James answered, he would give him no money to carry him out of his native land, adding he had done nothing worthy of banishment. After they had turned the land-end, the fever began to rage in the ship, especially among such who had been in the great vault of Dunnotter. Not a few of them were sick when they came aboard, and no wonder, considering the barbarous treatment they had met with; besides, much of the flesh which the captain of the ship had provided for the prisoners began to stink before they sailed out of Leith road, and in a few days it was not eatable. In a month's time the fever turned malignant, and few or none in the ship escaped it, in so much that it was usual to cast over board three or four dead bodies in one day. Most of the ship's crew, except the captain and boat-swain, died. Pitlochie who had freighted the ship, with his excellent lady, died likewise, and so enjoyed nothing of the produce of near a hundred prisoners gifted him by the council; and near seventy persons died at sea. I have before me a list of the passengers and prisoners who died at sea. It concerns the design of this history only to record the names of the prisoners, and they are as follows;

Perhaps several of the passengers might be likewise sufferers, but able to pay their freights; but I have not set them down, for shortness. I find further in the list, Mr. John Vernor and his wife, Pitlochy and his lady, and the lady Aitherny, Mrs. Riddel, Mrs. Eupham Rigg, lady Aitherny's daughter, William Rigg, her son, Mr. William Ged, and Mr. William Aisdale, minister. Notwithstanding of this raging sickness, and great death, much severity was used toward the prisoners, at sea, by the master of the ship and others: those under deck were not allowed to go about worship by themselves, and when they essayed it, the captain would throw down great planks of timber upon them to disturb them, and sometimes to the danger of their lives. We have heard of the

badness of their provisions already.

Many were the disasters of this voyage. The ship was at the utmost hazard by the breaking up of a leak at two several times. They had several calms, and some pretty severe storms. The captain, after Pitlochys' death, began to tamper with Mr. Johnston his son-in-law, who now had the disposal of the prisoners; and it was projected to carry them into Jamaica or Virginia, and the master offered to take all the prisoners there from him, and pay him in bulk. It was urged for this, that the markets were much better there for servants than at New Jersey. When they are thus treating, and near an issue, very much for the advantage of the passengers and prisoners, the wind turns straight for New Jersey, and they were forced to sail with it. There they arrived about the middle of December, after they had been about fifteen weeks at sea. At their landing many of them were sick; and Mr. Frazer observes, that a worthy gentleman from the west of Scotland died among their hands as they were carrying him ashore. The same person observes, that "partly of such who voluntarily offered themselves to go abroad from the Kingdom of Scotland, and partly of such who were persecuted by banishment, there were upwards of 60 died at sea, whose blood (adds he) will be found in the skirts of enemies, as really, as if they had died at the cross and Grass-market of Edinburgh." Before the prisoners came ashore, it was once intended by Mr. Johnston, to whom Pitlochy had made them over, to stop their getting out of the ship, till they should all of them, under their hand, sign a voluntary declaration, as it was called, that they offered four years' service at that place. But this they would not yield unto; yea, a considerable number of them joined in a protestation against their banishment, with a large narrative of the hardships they endured during their voyage, and formerly, for conscience sake.

When the prisoner's came ashore, the people who lived on the coastside, and had not the gospel settled among them, were harsh enough to them, and showed them no kindness. A little way up the country there was a town where there was a minister settled, and the inhabitants there were very kind to them. When they had information of the prisoners' circumstances, they invited all who were able to travel, to come and live with them, and sent horses for such as were not, and entertained them that winter freely, and with much kindness. In the following spring, Mr. Johnston, upon his father-in-law's gift of the prisoners, pursued them, and got them all cited before the court of that province. After hearing both sides, the governor called a jury to sit and cognosce upon the They found that the pannels had not of their own accord come to that ship, nor bargained with Pitlochy for money or service, and therefore, according to the laws of the country, they were assoiled; upon which most of the prisoners retired to New England, where they were very kindly entertained, and employed according to their different stations and capacities. Pitlochy proposed to be enriched by the prisoners, and yet he and his lady died at sea in the voyage. He sold what remained of the estate to pay the freight, and much of the money remaining was spent upon the law-suit in New Jersey. Thus it appears to be but a hazardous venture to make merchandise of the suffering people of God. A good many of the passengers and prisoners died in the plantations, the rest returned to their native country at the happy revolution,-Mr. Riddel, William Niven and others, and particuarly the laird of Barmagechan
